Meet the Artist ~ Cristina Arcenegui Bono

Cristina Arcenegui Bono is an award-winning quilter based in Spain. We became facebook friends over the past few years and I have loved seeing her work. I chose Cristina as my fiber artist this month because she did a wonderful reproduction of one of my favorite

Klimt quilts (see page 4). Here is a little about Cristina in her own words:

"I grew up in the south of Spain and although I didn't started sewing until my thirties, I spent countless afternoon sitting next to my aunt and my grandmother watching them sew on a treadle machine, a machine which I proudly inherited and which got me started into quilting. I started cross stitch and knitting as a teen, but it wasn't until I saw the movie "How to make an American quilt" that I heard about patchwork for the first time. I immediately became hooked on it and I made my first quilt while pregnant with my son Pablo.

Patchwork at the beginning of the century in Spain was something very few people practiced so I took every chance to get into intensive courses whenever any teacher came to my town to give an intensive course.

In 2003 I read about long arm quilting machines and I saw the perfect opportunity to work from home doing something I loved, machine quilting.

I open my machine quilting business in 2005 and I haven't stopped since them.

I have taken lectures and courses from the best artists in the patchwork industry by going to shows like New England Machine quilting festival, MQS and Houston.



Although I started making traditional quilts I quickly moved to modern quilts. My favorite thing to make is whole cloth quilts. My whole cloth quilts are far from traditional although I have a great respect for traditional whole cloths.

My quilts are very influenced by my childhood. I try to reflect the way I see the world now and as a child. Although four years ago I started making quilts based on illustrations from artists like Johanna Basford and Sveta Dorosheva, I am now moving to more whimsical quilts which are products of my imagination.

It is a joy for me to read or hear people's comments when they see one of my quilts. I want people to smile when they see my quilts, I want to transport them to somewhere safe and joyful. If I get that response, my objective will be accomplished.



I not only quilt tops for my clients but I also travel in Spain and North America give lectures and workshops on machine quilting and whimsical applique. My quilts have been exhibited in Europe and North America winning numerous awards at Houston, Paducah, Daytona Beach, Lancaster, Manchester, Birmingham and Spain.



I was scheduled to shoot a segment for "The Quilt Show" with Ricky Timms and Alex Anderson in March this year but then the COVID hit and everything was cancelled."

I hope that Cristina will have a chance to reschedule everything that has been affected by COVID. She will be part of the Global Quilt Connection on September 9. Her website is www.crisarcbono.com and her email is crisbono68@gmail.com.

Gustaf Klimt

Last month, I highlighted a fabric line by Robert Kaufmann based on the artwork of Klimt. It was serendipitous for Cristina to send me a photo of her quilt of her interpretation of Klimt's 1907 painting Adele Bloch-Bauer I. Klimt was an Austrian painter known for his iridescent, gilded artworks set in the context of turn of the 19th century Viennese social norms. A wonderful book written by Eva de Stefano looks at his life and art. Gustaf Klimt: Art Nouveau Visionary.

Roasted Tomato Sauce

We have lots of tomatoes in our garden and I decided that I am too old and crabby to go back to canning. So I started using this recipe for my tomatoes.



- ripe tomatoes quartered (4 lbs)
- 1 medium onion cut into quarters
- 4 cloves of garlic (more or less to taste)
- 2 tbsp Olive Oil to coat pan
- Salt and pepper to taste
- ◆ Optional ~ 1/2 bell pepper cut up
- 1 tbsp Fresh basil leaves chopped

Coat bottom of baking pan (I use 1/2 sheet pans that have sides with parchment paper) with olive oil. Place cut up ingredients. Salt and pepper. Toss to disperse salt and pepper and to coat ingredients with oil. Roast at 375° F. Stir occasionally. Roast until tomatoes start to caramelize (about 1 hour). The longer you roast the more the tomatoes caramelize and sweeten. Remove from oven and cool. Peel skins from tomatoes. Put all ingredients into food processor. If you are not going to use right away, you may freeze your sauce. When you take the sauce out of freezer, let thaw, then carefully spoon off watery liquid on top. Yummy!!!!!!



Our "In the Bag Club" uses Robert Kauffman's luscious Gustaf Klimt fabrics. The first project of "In the Bag" is this redesigned 3 Ring Binder Bag (look for club details on page 5). This bag features a pocket on the outside for your phone, an over the shoulder strap, pockets inside for business cards and pencils, and a zipper pouch large enough for most iPods. Flaps on the back of the binder fold over to protect the papers in your binder.



Kit includes everything you need except your binder and the thread! (Fabric, batting, zipper, Velcro, and interfacing.) For use with binders measuring 10" x 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ " and 1" to 2" thick.

Mini Notebook and Business Card Holder ~ Variation 2

When you signed up for this newsletter, you received a pattern for a Mini Notebook and Business Card Holder. Here is another little variation for your Mini Notebook – **some hand embroidery, beads and charms.**

On this example I used a little silver thread to stitch a dashed swirling line, added little blue beads and a dragonfly charm. The dragonfly was glued down with a bit of E6000 cement and then stitched down with silver thread.





The stitching and beading was done before the cover is assembled. If you refer to the original pattern, you would stitch after you complete step E.

Please note: the notebook that this holder covers is a top-bound spiral notebook 3" x 5". It was listed in the description but I neglected to add it to the supply list.

These little Notebooks are wonderful for party favors. If it's something that you would like and don't have the time, let me know. I charge \$8.00 per notebook (with notebook included) and \$10.00 for custom designed covers with embroidery or beading (for Bridal or Baby Showers, etc.)
